Hello Grace Family,

My name is Kim Iamiceli formally known as Kim Walker. I, with my parents (Carol and Tandy) and brother (Jason) joined Grace back in 1980-something when we moved from Yonkers to Mahopac. While living in Yonkers, I attended Village Lutheran Church in Bronxville and was a student at Chapel School from pre-school to 3<sup>rd</sup> grade. Within the walls of the

school and church, my relationship with God developed. I faithfully sang in the children's choir, was involved in faith-based school functions and attended impressive Oktoberfests. My church was home to my soul.

When we moved to Mahopac, we sadly said good-bye to Village Lutheran and began a search for a new church. My Mom, a born and raised Lutheran herself, armed with a list of criteria, decided to take a visit to Grace since it wasn't far from our new house. When she came upon the small brown building that barely resembled a church, she was not impressed. However, her opinion quickly changed upon meeting Pastor Kennedy, despite his 80's perm. My Mom expressed to Pastor Kennedy that she wanted to enroll my brother into Confirmation class but had no way to get him there since both of my parents were employed. They developed a ride share plan with another family and it worked perfectly. However, when it was my turn to go into Confirmation class, that was no longer an option. Pastor Kennedy graciously offered to drive me along with another child to confirmation class. Since I was generally the last to be picked up, I would spend quality time in the sanctuary with just myself and God.

In my young adult years, my family generally attended the 8:30 service. In my 20's, I worked several jobs, which included Sunday mornings and when Pastor Kennedy learned of this, he informed me where the spare key was. Although it may have been general knowledge of where this key was hidden, I felt quite special when Pastor Kennedy shared this information to me with the words "You come whenever you need to." I took him up on his offer (more times than I can count and still do) and once again, my soul found its home.

Through the years, Pastor Kennedy and Grace have been a part of my family's confirmations, weddings, deaths and baptisms (including my own, since I was baptized at home due to an illness). In times of joy and sadness, I've had a place to come to.

After a few years of my children attending Sunday School and with the gentle urging of Mil Yetter, I became a Sunday School teacher myself. The friendships I've developed within Grace and the friendships that my children have made are not only priceless but valued. To hear my children express their love for their church warms my heart. Their souls too, have found a home.

## How About a Tip For God?

*We tip well when we receive good service .*

Even when ordering at a counter these days, you place your order, stick your chip into the reader, or tap your phone, or scan the barcode on your screen and then ... the cashier turns the screen around or a message pops up on the card reader asking if you want to add a tip and offering a minimum of 15% or more and it is an extra step if you want to give less - a "Custom Tip" or if you want to opt out of giving any tip. And then the cashier will see right away that you did not tip or that you did less than 15%??? And what about the person in line behind you??? There was a time when tipping was enjoyable; when you were happy to show your appreciation for good service by adding a little extra to the bill. And, it still may be that when we are not feeling pressured or our expression of "thanks" does not seem demanded of us. So, do not feel pressured and do not think something is being demanded of you, but consider undertaking this challenge for the rest of the year: Ask yourself at the end of the day, "What would I tip God for today?" If God had a tip jar on your dresser, would you feel like God deserved at least a \$1 for that day? Give it a try. And then, bring whatever you tipped God during the week to church on Sunday and drop in the offering plate - no pressure, no expectation - just a way for you to privately say thanks to God; a tip for the good things God gives to us every day!

## Sunday, September 8th!

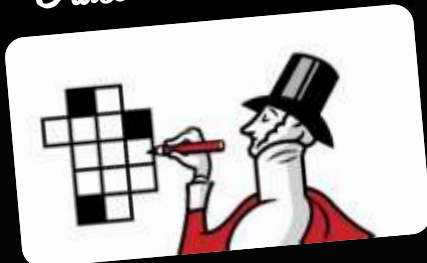
Worship at 8:30 a.m. & 11:00 a.m.

*First Class is on Sept 8 as part of Rally Day or Monday Sept 16.*

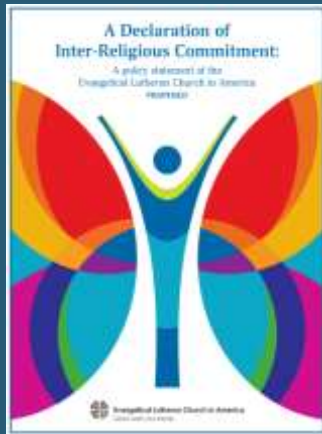

## 2019 ELCA CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY

AUGUST 5-10, 2019 • MILWAUKEE



We are called by God and freed in Christ to witness to the life-changing news of Jesus Christ and to love and serve our neighbors in a multi-religious world. This vocation includes loving and serving both those who share our faith in Jesus Christ and those who do not. It is our duty and joy to extend God's love, grace, mercy, and justice to all those who are made in the image of God and to the whole of creation. . . Our vocation, our calling to be a neighbor, excludes no one, even those whose religion is different from our own. . .

To know how to best serve the community, we need to understand what benefits all parts of that community. This means reaching out to neighbors across the boundaries of religion, race, ethnicity, gender, and class. Our vocation also includes serving *alongside* our neighbor, as we respond together to meet the needs of others. While we may not necessarily share the same religious inspiration for doing so, our shared vision for peace and justice leads us to engage in service for the sake of the world. . . Being a neighbor can be risky. When power is abused, and fear grips a community or a nation, standing up for those who are being targeted or excluded takes courage. We are called to exhibit this courage and take this risk. In the face of social pressures that make us feel paralyzed, our calling includes developing a sense of agency—that is, a sense that each of us can make a difference. Our attention needs to be focused on our God-given gifts and responsibilities rather than on the many impediments to acting on behalf of those who are being maligned or harassed or harmed, recognizing that some of our neighbors are experiencing multiple forms of oppression at once. . . In the United States, many Christians live in neighborhoods that are predominantly Christian, where social expectations, such as holidays, school vacations, work rules, and the clothes we wear, have accommodated their beliefs and practices. The same is often not true for our neighbors who practice other religions or those who practice no religion at all. They can be at a disadvantage and made to feel like outsiders. As a result, we are called to be sensitive toward our neighbors of other religions and worldviews, engaging them in the spirit of accompaniment. This includes listening and learning, giving and receiving. It also means recognizing that other religions are organized differently, sometimes with very few or no structures corresponding to our own. Assumptions about cultural norms, affecting both ourselves and our neighbors, need to be constantly identified and avoided. Determining together the right pace for building and deepening partnerships is a way in which we can begin to practice mutual hospitality and live in solidarity with our neighbor. Our calling is to be both faithful witnesses and good neighbors. We enter into this calling in a spirit of humility and self-criticism, repentant of our past mistakes, anticipating that we will continue to fall short of God's vision, and committed to the justice, peace, and well-being of our neighbors. We accept that we will have unanswered questions about how God is working in and through our neighbors of other religions and even in and through us. Yet, we anticipate that in loving, serving, and standing in solidarity with our neighbors, we will experience the presence of God, participate in building a more just and faith enriched world.

Every 3 years the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, of which Grace and 3.5 million other Lutherans are part of, gathers for a Churchwide Assembly. The Lutherans who attend are delegates of all kinds elected by congregations like Grace from all over the U.S. These delegates were elected at the 65 annual Synod Assemblies held throughout the ELCA. Gathering in Milwaukee, WI this August, the Assembly worshipped, studied, prayed, deliberated and voted on the ELCA budget, Social Statements, Presiding Bishop and ELCA Constitution matters. What follows are just some highlights of the accomplishments of this Assembly.



The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton was re-elected presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Aug. 6 at the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. On the first ballot, 897 votes were cast and 670 votes were needed for election. Eaton received 725 votes, which is 81.19% of the vote. Eaton is the first ELCA presiding bishop to win re-election on the first ballot. She was elected to a first term as presiding bishop at the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Pittsburgh.

## Sanctuary Denomination



From the ELCA website, [ELCA.org](http://ELCA.org) . . .

In its simplest form, becoming a sanctuary denomination means that the ELCA is publicly declaring that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith. In baptism, we are brought into a covenantal relationship with Jesus Christ that commits us to strive for justice and peace in all the earth. Following the example of Martin Luther, we believe that advocacy is a crucial expression of baptismal identity. As a church, we have advocated for stopping the detention of children and families for decades. We have spoken out against family separation, sought a pathway to citizenship for community members who have lived in the U.S. for many years, and have taken steps to address the root causes of migration in a way that honors the humanity in people who must flee.

Through the ELCA's AMMPARO strategy, we continue this work. [Talking points](#), articles, videos and resources are housed here so this church can have conversations about what sanctuary means with many of our members in their context to discern future action and direction. Becoming a sanctuary denomination was voted on and passed by the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Milwaukee.

Being a sanctuary denomination means that we, as church together, want to be public and vocal about this work. It will look different for everyone, but welcoming people is not a political issue for us – it is a matter of faith.

Their generosity will give many area children the tools they need to have a successful school year. Thank you so much for contributing to our School Supply Drive!



***Sometimes it does take a village to help raise a child.*** Each year, the Community Food Pantry at St. Mary's Mohegan Lake collects school supplies that are distributed to families with school aged children at the start of the new school year. Last year, 279 children received a backpack and basic supplies. That is 49 more backpacks than the year before. School supplies needed include pencils, crayons, highlighters, markers, pens, notebooks (marble or other kinds), composition paper, folders, rulers, or maybe even a backpack to carry all those

supplies.

We are also collecting school supplies for School Kits for Lutheran World Relief. Education is one of the strongest tools a community has for breaking the cycle of poverty. Ensuring that girls attend school, especially in places where their access is deprioritized, has even stronger results. School Kits contain essential supplies to help children – and in some cases, adults – continue learning in the face of serious obstacles. That learning leads to a better life for them, their families and their communities. We will be assembling the LWR School Kits in September. The supplies to be included in a School Kit are very specific. They are:

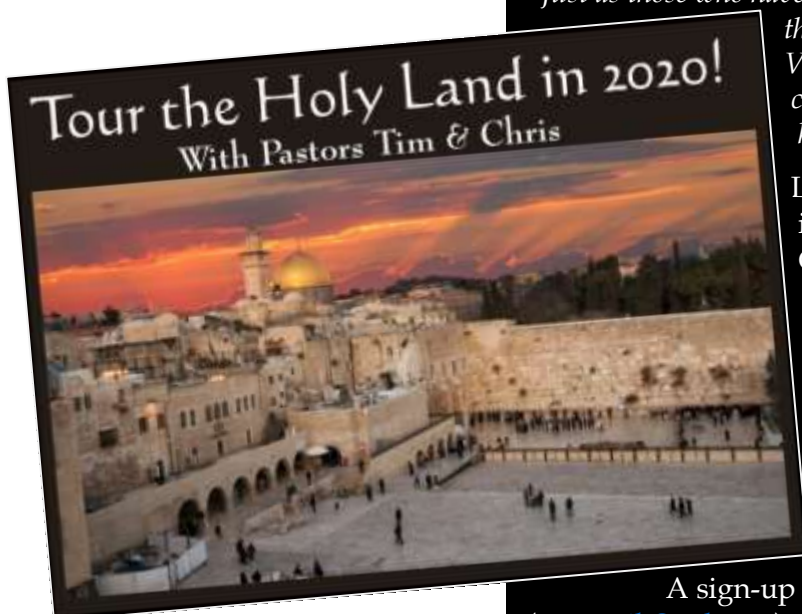
- 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper, approximately 8" x 10 ½"; no loose-leaf paper
- 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- Pencil sharpener
- Pair of blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- Unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers
- Black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink)
- Box of 16 or 24 crayons
- 2 ½" eraser



When you are out shopping and see those back-to-school sales, please remember the children in our community and around the world for whom a gift of school supplies can make a huge difference in their lives. The school kits we assembled in 2018 were shipped to Domenica and Nicaragua in February 2019.

Supplies may be dropped off at Grace during church office hours, Monday through Friday from 9:00 am to 1:00 or Sunday mornings during July and August. If you are not a shopper of school supplies and still wish to contribute to a successful start of the new school year for our children, you can donate directly to the Community Food Pantry by visiting the pantry website, [cfpstmarysmoheganlake.com](http://cfpstmarysmoheganlake.com) (be sure to indicate the donation is for school supplies), or you can make a donation through Grace by check, offering plate envelope or online, designating school supplies for either the Pantry or for LWR.
